2022 was a year of planning for the future of FHSR with a focus on growth in programs, partnerships and community support. FHSR expanded our strategic partnerships to bring our programs to new suburbs of Chicago, reducing barriers to participation for our families. In addition, we worked to cross enroll our children in multiple programs to layer their support and create stronger outcomes. Our Music Therapy pilot program, provides high quality therapeutic services for children living with hearing loss at no cost in a fun engaging format. Based on the outcomes from the 2022 pilot, Music Therapy will be an integral part of our programs moving forward starting in 2023.

As an organization, we are always looking to science and research to inform our program development and 2022 provided a wealth of information regarding issues children with hearing loss are facing. Coming out of the pandemic it became clear that literacy and school readiness was going to be a hurdle for many deaf and hard of hearing children. In 2023 FHSR will address this issue by launching the EARs Early Intervention Literacy program to support birth-three learning initiatives.

Research also spoke to issues around isolation for children and families, so we safely brought our families together to celebrate the power of hearing and the joy of music at our annual Cheers for Ears family concert. This year we celebrated with an outdoor concert featuring Laurie Berkner at our new strategic partner, Ravinia Festival. We are excited to see this partnership expand for future events in 2023.

It would be remiss if we did not address the economic uncertainty many families with deaf and hard of hearing children face and the hardship of having a child with a disability. The team at FHSR rolled up our sleeves to fundraise a remarkable \$10,000 for the pediatric Loaner Hearing Aid Bank at Advocate Children's Hospital in Oak Lawn. FHSR will be working even harder in 2023 to increase our funding for this key support program.

We are honored to have supported over 850 deaf and hard of hearing children and their families in 2022 and look forward to reaching even more in 2023 with our high-quality programs. Thank you to all our donors for supporting FHSR, your generosity changes a child's life for the better!


HIGHLIGHTING Music Therapy



Our 12-week Music therapy program is tuition-free to all children with hearing loss, and held in Chicago and Western Springs

This small group DHH specific curriculum for 5-8-year-olds with hearing loss program brings together the science and fun behind what is known as sneaky therapy. With Program objectives such as: self-confidence, socialization, articulation, receptive listening and fun our children with hearing loss have made great strides on measurement criteria and enjoyed themselves at the same time.


